1938 Membership

J Donaghy (Nursing Society) questioned the activities of the society.

J (First Love) noted, to organise activities with like-minded people generally have a good time and spread the love.

L Symonds (Aerial Arts) noted gym can still run the sessions, but Aerial can organise more events and conditioning training.

Yates (Gymnastics) noted due to the overlaps there needs to be more discussion, therefore defer this matter to the next meeting.

T Payne (Lacrosse) questioned what the concept of First Love is.

(First Love) noted they are a society across the world, noted they are a Christian based society.

Chair noted these societies will be debated at the next meeting.

1947 University Committee Reports

No report had been given as committees had only just been appointed.

1948 Student Officer Committee Report

Council received a report from J Swo (Welfare, Community and Diversity) and T Etheridge (Non Portfolio) of the nature and

members of SOC, along with the activities SOC had done since the last meeting of Council.

J Williams (LGBT+ Caucus) questioned why funding requests go through SOC and not Council.

J Swo (Welfare, Community and Diversity) noted this had always been the case.

C Mellows (Labour) questioned what other events SOC had planned for the mental health matters campaign.

J Swo (Welfare, Community and Diversity) noted there is currently no waiting time for Counselling. Noted a more long term plan of working alongside SSS is in progress.

1949 Trustee Board

T Antoniou Phillips (Undergraduate) provided Council with a report from the trustee board. Noted the structure of the trustee board.

1950 Reports From Representatives

J Frank-Keyes (Concrete) raised an issue with the recently added society The Broad UEA, they questioned how conflict between the two would be avoided.

L Martin (The Broad) noted they are not looking to step on any toes, noted they are looking for a buzzfeed like format.

E Hoepelman (Migrant Solidarity campaign) noted there are increasing concerns regarding storage. Noted as the demolition of Calais jungle grows nearer, it is more important to increase collections, yet noted they are being urged to vacate the current storage space within the Union.

M Colledge (Postgraduate) noted they will take it to management committee.

OPEN DISCUSSION – Higher Education Post Brexit

Council heard a presentation from J Dickinson (Chief Executive) on the forecasts for the educational climate since Britain voted to leave the EU. Noted mainly international students are going to be effected, moreover Universities will find it much harder to attract non-English speaking students, along with less researching funding from EU bodies, and many courses will be affected.

A procedural motion had been brought to Council by A Moore (Drama) to bring motion 1958 to the top of the agenda.

Chair moved Council to a vote.

Council moved item 1958 to the top of the agenda.

1958 The Provision of a Sufficient Office Space for Nightline

M Govan (Nightline) gave a speech in favour of the motion, made clear how important NN is at UEA, and noted the way in which they have been treated is unjust. Noted the new office on floor 02 of the Library, volunteers are no longer able to eat or sleep in their 12 hour shift, which goes against their human rights.

A Summation had been given to Council by A Moore (Drama).

Chair moved Council to a vote.

Council adopted the resolution.

1951 Composite resolution on the Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF) and the National Student Survey (NSS)

Chair noted this motion is a combination of two similarly submitted resolutions. Moreover there have been amendments submitted to the resolution, these disagree on how to oppose the NSS. Chair noted a speech for the motion as a whole, then the speeches for the first amendment.

F Northrop (Non Portfolio) gave a speech in favour of the composite motion. Noted how fees effect the choices of working class children as they go for more marketable courses than following their dreams. Noted NSS scores will be used to raise fees higher and faster. Noted the disagreement has come from what action is taken against fee rises.

T Antonious Phillips (Undergraduate) speech in favour of their amendment. Noted a boycott of the NSS is not a productive way to fight against fee rises. Noted there are problems with the NSS, however many services on campus have directly been improved through its results.

M Colledge (Postgraduate) provided a speech against the amendment. Noted the postgraduate assembly voted on this issue and mandated the Officer to bring their collective voice to Council. PhD students are invaluable to the way UEA is run, they will be directly affected by TEF as it will create more pressure, distancing them from quality teaching.

A Rust (Campaigns and Democracy) gave a speech in favour of the amendment. Noted a boycott would be unachievable and highly unpopular. Noted the Undergraduate Officer has had testimonials from academics across campus to not boycott the NSS. J Swo (Welfare, Community, and Diversity) gave a speech against the amendment. Noted despite students performing well, students were more likely to report positively for teachers who look most like them, therefore noted this is not an accurate assessment of actual teaching performance. Noted relevance as this information goes into TEF, this may affect the teaching excellence of academics of colour, and women academics.

T Antoniou-Phillips (Undergraduate) had given a speech in favour of the amendment. Noted all institutions in the TEF will be able to increase their fees by inflation, whether the NSS is boycotted or not, noted for an institution the size of UEA we would need 1000 students to boycott for there to be an effect, noted they do not believe this is achievable.

F Northrop (Non Portfolio) had given a speech against the amendment. Noted there are many data sources, a single question in the NSS at the end of three years is not good enough. Noted past action has not worked, a unified student voice is needed noted that is what the boycott shows.

E Agu (Ethical Issues) questioned

M Fadul-Gomez (Disney) questioned whether the NSS takes into account international students' experience, and does the TEF effect their fees.

E Cutler (ECO) questioned how will you get students to boycott it? Noted the Union has not been very successful in the past with boycotts.

T Thomson (Quidditch) noted the NSS is important, questioned what other surveys are there, and how would they bridge the gap.

T Payne (Lacrosse) questioned if no boycott, what other option is there to have our voices heard?

T Barker (PG) questioned how long the boycott would need to be in place for there to be a significant disturbance.

R Purtill (pride) questioned why F Northrop believed the NUS to be right in this instance.

J Robinson (Non-Portfolio) asked why is it that we have to spend our time getting 1000 to complete this, noted why not devote our time to other pressing matters.

F Northrop (Non Portfolio) provided a final argument against the amendment along with answers to the posed questions. Noted getting 1000 would be a challenge but the officer team are highly dedicated and noted it can be done. Further noted rejecting this

amendment and passing the resolution gives students the opportunity to choose whether to boycott or not.

A Summation had been given to Council from T Antoniou-Phillips (Undergraduate). Noted there are no other surveys that ask the same questions as the NSS. Believed it will take several years of boycotting for the campaign to be successful.

Chair moved Council to a vote on the 1st proposed Amendment

Council added the amendment to the motion.

E Bassey (Mary Chapman) questioned whether 49% had been enough to win a vote at Council.

Chair noted it is.

Council adopt the Resolution with amendment 1.

Council had reached its guillotine time, therefore the meeting had been adjourned.

1968 Time and Place of the next Meeting.

Chair noted the time and place of the meeting is 7 pm on the 3^{rd} of November, in the Enterprise Centre Lecture Theatre.
