## We note

- 1. Tuition fees have risen to £9000.
- 2. The sudden increase in fees has prevented some students from continuing to pursue a career in medicine.
- 3. Competition into medical school is extremely high
- 4. Many students who do not receive a place at medical school choose to reapply as a graduate.
- 5. Universities offer alternative courses to students who miss out on a place as a route in Medicine.
- 6. 5 year courses are now only an option for students from privileged backgrounds preventing diversity.
- 7. There are a limited number of graduate entry courses and places.
- 8. Competition is fierce for graduate entry courses: 30:1.
- 9. No financial support available from SFE for tuition fees
- 10. Personal development loans have become unavailable
- 11. No bursaries to graduates on health courses at UEA
- 12. The number of graduate students applying to Medicine has fallen.
- 13. Graduate medical students have been shown to make better and more motivated doctors
- 14. Graduate Medical students bring a diverse range of skills and experience to Medical School.
- 15. Undergraduate students with three A's were offered a substantially bursary which was not used to directly support their education.

## We believe

- 1. All students should have the opportunity to enter a career in medicine
- 2. The increase in tuition fees does not widen access to medicine
- 3. Graduate students bring life experience and additional skills to the profession.
- 4. The medical school will no longer have a diverse intake of individuals
- 5. Graduate students will be forced to undertake a number of part time jobs which could affect their studies and put them at a disadvantage to their peers.
- 6. Medicine will be a career for only the rich
- 7. Unlike most degrees choosing to study medicine also means choosing a career. Some people may not realise they want to enter this profession till later in their life and UEA are denying this opportunity.
- 8. UEA should be encouraging graduates to apply to their Medical School
- 9. Graduate medical students are being discriminated for having a degree despite being denied the opportunity to study medicine at 18 years old.

## We resolve

- 1. To encourage the University to recognise the hardships of graduate students on undergraduate courses, in particular medicine.
- 2. To encourage the University to offer more support and financial assistance to Graduate medical students in the form of bursaries and loans
- 3. To lobby the University to open the £1500 bursary award to Graduate Medical students with a 2:1/1<sup>st</sup> degree and use the money to directly reduce the cost of tuition fees
- 4. To lobby the University to encourage graduate students into a career in Medicine
- 5. To lobby the University to recognise the qualifications of graduate medical students and their achievements to receive a place at medical school
